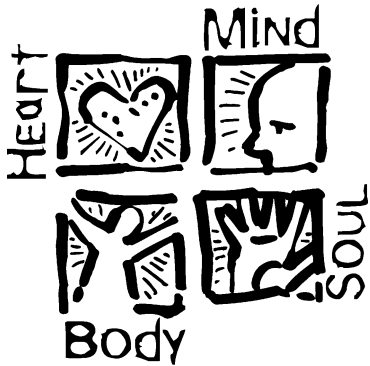

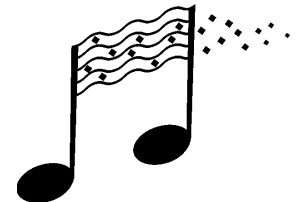

Program Needs for Incoming Refugee Families

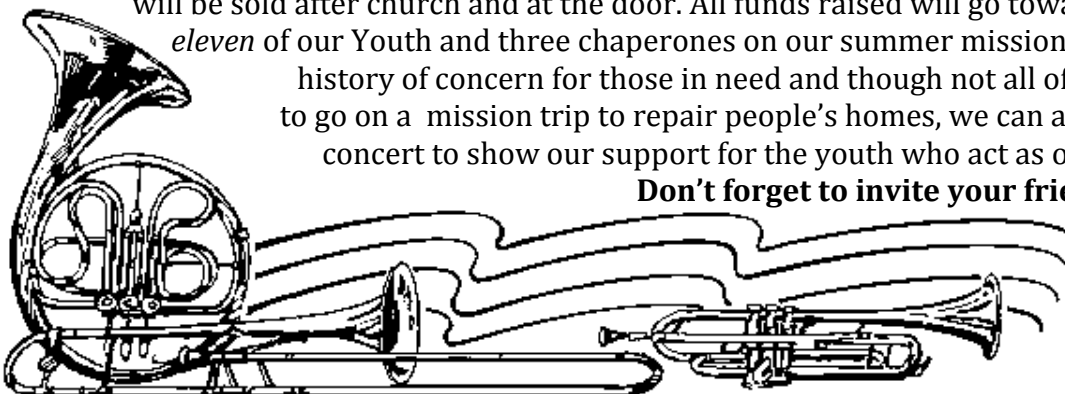

Scott Manuel's Mission Trip to Haiti

Eight members of our Central New York Alliance for Haiti returned April 8 from northern rural Haiti. Our six-day mission trip was centered around St. Yves Parish in Thibeau, about 30 miles south of Cape Haitian. My initial impression of the area around St. Yves was one of contrasts. For example, many people have cell phones, but are lacking in sanitary needs such as running water and toilets.

We were housed and wonderfully fed in the rectory of St. Yves parish. Sunday we adjusted to our new environment and worshiped with about 450 Haitians in a church built with help from people of Central NY. Lunch that day was shared with representatives of the "iF" Foundation, a non-profit organization making loans for small local business start-ups. (We ate turkey from an "iF" sponsored turkey farm.)

Monday our real work began. St. Joseph's Elementary is a school of 288 students supported 100% by the efforts of St. James Church in Cazenovia and our Cayuga/Syracuse Presbytery Haiti Educational Partnership and friends. At the school, team member Harry Dross instructed the principal of St. Joseph's Elementary on how to use a flip camera and installed a new hard drive for his computer. Members Georgette Schmidt and Karen Dross made final preparations for in-service training in methods for teaching French and math for the local teachers, while Marilyn Cornell visited the venue for workshops in art and reading-readiness for pre-school instructors. Georgette and I facilitated communications by interpreting for Marilyn and Karen from English to French. Wynetta Devore and Stefan Merchant distributed materials and modeled doing the projects in shapes, colors, bubbles and collages. Marilyn arrived with suitcases full of supplies necessary to complete the lessons.

Trip coordinator Bob Hood (from St. James Parish) spent the time inspecting progress in previously planned improvements in the school compound. One of his tasks was to deliver 117 pairs of used eyeglasses collected by students in Jamesville-DeWitt High School to the small medical clinic at St. Joseph's. These had been measured and marked, compliments of Malara Eyecare and Eyewear Gallery in Liverpool, prior to our departure.

The next two days were spent implementing the trip goals. After a regular one o'clock dismissal, the Americans taught the host teachers student-centered lessons, as opposed to rote memorization. Thursday, the CNY pedagogues watched while Haitian instructors demonstrated what they had learned. The school day ended with an assembly including singing, dancing and some speeches by the elementary students.



That afternoon, several of us visited four literacy sites sponsored by our CNY Alliance for Haiti. Most of the classrooms were rustic, to say the least, but instruction was most animated and student enthusiasm palpable. Some of the classes were studying voter participation, a timely topic given their recent presidential election. This program was piloted by our own Central New York's Ruth Colvin, affectionately known in Haiti as Tante Ruth (Aunt Ruth).

Each morning prior to our half hour drive to St. Joseph's, we taught English lessons to about twenty locals from age ten to sixty. Although the students in attendance varied from day to day, enthusiasm was infectious and the last class ended with requests for more. The classes also gave us an opportunity to practice our Créole during instruction. Continuation is planned for the next group scheduled to travel there in June.

Prior to flying back to the US we went on a brief tour of the capital, Port-au-Prince. Little of the effects of the year-ago earthquake have been resolved. Tent cities and port-a-potties are still much in evidence. A bright light was a visit to Matthew 25, a house of hospitality for visitors to Haiti and a school. Recently the tent city housed on its soccer field was closed and the field was now being prepared for play.

UCF's donation to St. Joseph's School from the Brass and Bells concert helped to grade the playground and purchase some volleyball and basketball equipment. Visiting Haiti is an eye opener and many more trips and donations will be needed to continue the progress made so far.

MEMORIAL GARDEN UPDATE

The Memorial Garden was originally envisioned in 1960 to control drainage from the road, and to create an attractive place of recreation, relaxation and beauty within our church grounds. This space served the church well for many years. Over time, and with changes to our eastern entry way, this space fell into disrepair.

Two years ago, we began a process of reclaiming our Memorial Garden. We used the expertise of a landscape architect to develop a concept that would be functional as well as beautiful. A committee of dedicated people took that concept and used it as a springboard to look at what was there, and what needed to be changed. We took out existing structures, renovated others, and added new ones. We were able to preserve some plants, added new ones, and relocated others.

There is still a little bit of work to be done: installation of grape arbor, removal of a weathered planter, and spring weeding. But, for all intents and purposes, the project is complete. We are planning a "soft opening" (to use a retailing phrase) for the middle of May, after service, as we begin our outdoor Fellowship time. Many thanks to all who worked on this project and to those who made donations to make this concept a beautiful reality.

Income for January, February and March lagged behind expenses. Year to date expenses are ahead of income by \$11,313. The good news is that we are making up ground since January.

The above chart compares pledge and plate giving as a percent of the budgeted amount for the year. If income was steady throughout the year and met projections, we would expect to be at 33 percent at the end of the March. This chart shows that income (in those categories) is well below expectations.

As we head into the summer months, do remember the church relies on your regular contributions to keep our ministry running effectively.

CONGREGATIONAL CARE CONCERNS

Recently it has again come to our attention that some of our members have been hospitalized, and were puzzled that they had not seen or heard from anyone in their United Church Family. We want to remind everyone that due to the nature of today's privacy laws (HIPAA), hospitals, rehab facilities and nursing homes no longer call churches even if you give that information when you are admitted. If you or a loved one is hospitalized, **we need you or your family or friends to notify us.** It would be much better to have the church called 4 or 5 times than to have someone feeling like they had been forgotten. We are very aware that some people are also private about being hospitalized, do not feel up to having a lot of visitors or phone calls, or do not want to appear on the prayer list. Our sincere hope is that you would call Rev. Even, the church office, or the Congregational Care Team chairpersons (Cindy Rosbrook 682-7982 or Barbara Johnson 682-2042) and let us know how best we can minister to you or your loved one (visits, phone calls, cards, none of the above, or any combination of the above). Thank you in advance for helping us better Care for our Congregation.

Loving requests from your Congregational Care Committee:

1. Are you living alone? Your Congregational Care Committee is compiling a list of emergency contact persons and phone numbers to be kept in the Church office. This information will be kept confidential and used only in an emergency. Age is not a factor; if you are living alone please contact the Church office with this information.
2. For **ALL** of us, there are "**File of Life**" magnetic pockets for your refrigerator available on the file cabinet in the office. The Fayetteville Fire Department has generously provided them and every home should have them completed and posted on the refrigerator to assist fire and medical personnel in the event of an emergency. Please help them to help you!
